Happy New Year and CONGRATULATIONS! We begin the year 2020 with \$37,130.00 in our Class Gift Fund!

This is up from \$32,205 in mid-December, a remarkable growth of \$4,925 since our last email on December 16, and \$2,130 beyond our year-end goal of \$35,000.

The Class of 1970 Endowment Fund



We have surpassed the \$25,000 minimum for establishing an endowment fund as our class gift to Gallaudet. Our endowment principal will be held forever. Between four and five percent of the market value will be paid out each year to support an initiative established by the fund. What better way for the Class of 1970 to say thank you to and to invest in Gallaudet University. (See Issue 6, April 2019 for more information about endowments.)

Now it is time to decide what we as a class will support through our endowment fund. To give you an idea, here is a list of all the current funds at Gallaudet: <u>https://www.gallaudet.edu/PDF%20Files/gallaudet-endowment-funds-list-072319.pdf</u>. If you scroll down this list, you will see eight class funds, all of which support student scholarships. We can also support scholarships, but we can, if we prefer, support programs, research, or other areas such as the Gallaudet museum or Alumni Relationships. We want to include ALL class members in determining what our class will thank Gallaudet. To do this, we will conduct at least two surveys. The first survey is designed to get a sense of what aspects of Gallaudet we value as a class. You will be able to choose from the general categories of scholarships, programs, research, and others. A text box will be included to allow you to write more specifically what you wish to support.

The second survey will be based on your responses. We will share survey results and subsequent plans as we proceed. Our goal is to make our decision prior to our gathering in October 2020.

The more responses we receive, the better we will be able to determine a gift to Gallaudet that represents ALL of us! When you receive the survey, please respond as quickly as you can. Thank you!

In 1967, the Chesapeake Amateur Hockey League began, and the Gallaudet Ice Hockey team, with 18 very talented players joined. Most of them were from Canada. Many of the games were played at Uline Arena (renamed Washington Coliseum), which was about 4 blocks from Gallaudet. They played against 8 teams from around the Washington, DC area.

At the first few games, there were only about 30 fans cheering for the Gallaudet Ice Hockey team. After hearing about how very exciting the games were, more and more Gallaudet fans began showing up to cheer. The loyal fans would brave the 4 blocks in the freezing weather to see the hockey games. One of the fans mentioned that she was looking forward to getting out of the cold, only to find that the arena was equally cold. Well, we couldn't let the ice melt, could we? Gallaudet fans were thrilled with the very fast paced games, with lots of body checks and fighting. The players would drop their gloves and sticks to fight. That made the fans getting all fired up and start yelling and swearing. They also yelled loud when their team made a goal. The deaf players couldn't hear the yelling but they knew they were being cheered by the fans standing up and waving the fists

It was a brand new and exciting era in hockeydom. For the first time, the hearing players in the league were playing against an all deaf team. The hearing players were told to stop moving and stay in place to let the deaf players know when the whistle was blown. Sometimes it didn't work, and a deaf player would skate all the way to the opposite end to shoot a goal.

The National Brewers were the powerhouse of the amateur league, and they considered the Gallaudet Ice Hockey team their strongest opponent. Gallaudet did win the conference championship one season.

It was with great sadness when the Gallaudet Ice Hockey team disbanded in 1975. Canada's provincial governments decided not to continue financial support for students attending Gallaudet due to the enormous cost of the tuition. Consequently, there were fewer talented hockey players left.



My mom was the best. She kept all my letters that I wrote back home during all my five years at Gallaudet. As I was walking down the memory lane reading my handwritten letters, I came across this one and felt compelled to share it with you all.

Letter was written on November 7, 1966.

"Well, to begin this wild story and you probably would not believe it. Let's go back to October (1st part) Sara and I were in our room when all of sudden our window blinds clattered for no reason. The windows were closed. Then some time later when Sara was taking a nap, her bedspread was "blown" by a strong current and then she felt a loud thump and after that she heard a slam on the doorway. The exactly same thing happened to me. I thought that she was in the room and when the door was opened, it caused all of those mishaps explained above but it didn't. So we decided to call our "ghost" Becky. Ever since something happened, we usually would tell Becky to stop that. Then last week when Sara was alone in the room, the lights went off and then on. She ran out and thought that she would catch a prankster but she did not. No one was in sight. Then next night when Sara was sleeping, she woke up and thought that I sat on her feet but there was no one except herself in the room. Boy, she ran out for life. We explained all those incidents to some girls. Petrone, so curious, decided that she wanted to meet Becky, the ghost. So she visited us one night, hoping that her wish would come true. She and Sara decided to put my miniature gavel in one certain place and left the room locked. Spent a half hour in snack bar celebrating Sara's birthday. (10 of us girls were there to celebrate). When we returned, we could hear our heart thumping, opened the door and found the gavel in other place. Screaming, we ran down the hallway meeting Mrs. Cox. She "investigated our room, laughing all the time and said, "Halloween is over" and "Maybe Miss Peet's soul is here". And ever since the topic about Becky was the main topic on the campus for almost two weeks. I believe that about 100 girls already visited our room. Boy what a headache. I am sure that it will be printed in Buff and Blue."

NOTE: Sara and I finally got our plea to move to Cogswell Hall in February. Someone said a student died in that very room. Believe it or not?

This issue will cover how the Alumni Emeritus Club was originated.

But, of course, it is going to be awesome and memorable if we all could be there together for that ceremony! At this writing, the induction will be held on Friday, October 30, from 2 to 3 PM. The location is to be announced later. All we need to do is to make sure we are in our seats by 1:45 PM. The program is sponsored by the Office of Alumni Relations, Gallaudet University.

Here goes the story of the history of the Gallaudet Emeriti Club Program as quoted from Daphne Cox...

Daphne Cox, '82 and Gallaudet retiree since 2016. Daphne worked in the Office of Alumni Relations for thirteen years from 1995 to 2008. While employed with the Office of Alumni Relations, from time to time, I went to a conference for Alumni professionals as a part of professional development.

In January 2004, I, in my position as Associate Director of Alumni Relations, attended CASE (Council for Advancement and Support of Education) Conference in San Diego, CA, to get new ideas for the expansion of HC programs involving alumni of color, affinity groups, 50+year classes, program milestones, etc.

One lady from Colorado college gave a presentation about its Alumni Emeriti Club Program. The program is a graduation-like ceremony with the President and Provost in full graduation regalia, historical tidbits from that class' time, the presentation of the medallion and a photo opportunity with the President. The concept got my full attention. After the workshop, I sat down with her asking questions, picking on her brain for the establishment of a similar program at Gallaudet. She sent me a package containing samples and materials a week later. I dived into the new project with enthusiasm...
