# **The Committee Chart**



### CLASS GIFT FUND STATUS as of April 14, 2020:

We did not meet our goal of \$50,000 and 50% participation by March 31, 2020. The good news is our class gift fund has grown to **\$44,965**, up \$2,080 since our last newsletter. We are \$5,035 closer to our goal.

Overall, we have 82 donors, 79 of whom are class members, with 45 (57%) repeat donors. In the last month, we gained eight new donors, six of whom are class members. Our participation rate is now **39.7%**, up from 37.0% at mid-March.

## CLASS OF 1970 ENDOWMENT FUND SURVEY UPDATE:

We will soon send a new survey proposing criteria for the Class of 1970 endowment fund. The criteria are based on the results of our first survey, in which only three criteria were suggested by multiple respondents: (1) students with financial need, (2) international students, and (3) students in good academic standing. The survey will seek your approval of these criteria for our endowment fund.

Our goal is to establish a fund that will guarantee student support every year, and to avoid including criteria that is difficult to apply consistently from year to year. The general criteria of "students in good standing with financial need, to include international students" will not exclude students with other characteristics that individuals cited in the

first survey (e.g., students with a focus on Deaf Culture/Deaf-Blind Studies, students who are single mothers, Deaf students with disabilities).

The survey will include a comment box where you can express any additional thoughts and concerns you would like us to consider.

We now have a balance of \$5,714.06 in our Class70 Treasury Fund, PNC Bank.

Currently our 50th Class70 Reunion committees are planning for our 50th class reunion events on October 28-31, 2020. Some our classmates send their money to our Treasury Fund to maintain our financial security to support our expenditures such as paper

goods, printing materials, stamps, decorations, etc. and to support **Paul Stefurak** for his expenditures on his website, <u>Gally70.com</u>.

It would be greatly appreciated if you continue pitch in to achieve that goal. The only thing you need to understand that you cannot file your tax exempt for donation in 2020 IRS because we do not have 501c3 tax exemption. The following steps what I do with your check:

## My Debts of Gratitude to Gallaudet University Submitted by Robert Harris

My name is Robert Harris. I was asked to write a brief sketch about who I am since I went to Gallaudet University for only a short time. I grew up orally and went to a small liberal hearing college --Lake Forest College, a northern suburb of Chicago. As a freshman, I met a CODA, a sophomore. His mother was an Assistant Professor of Psychology at Gallaudet University. I asked him many questions about Gallaudet. At that time, I was majoring in chemistry.

As a sophomore, I was required to take a course: Intro to Psychology. I fell in love with the professor who wrote a book about a math formula (cognitive psychology) in terms of information processing. I was fascinated with the math formula because it helped me to articulate how deaf people can receive equal amounts of information that hearing people receive, academically speaking. I dreamed of becoming a superintendent of a school for the deaf and leading the school to undertake major reforms to incorporate total communication (sign language and speaking at the same time) in classes. I changed my major from chemistry to psychology.

I met Dr. McCay Vernon, a nationally reputed research psychologist for the deaf, in Chicago where he worked at Michael Reese Hospital doing a national research grant on deaf patients. I told him of my dream of becoming a superintendent someday. He warned me that at that time (1968), the hearing community was not ready to accept such a superintendent who is deaf. He suggested that I follow his steps to becoming a psychologist to work with deaf people.

At same the time, I noted that my classmates undertook a study aboard in other countries. I told myself why not me do it by customizing a study aboard at Gallaudet

University for one semester to learn sign language and deaf culture. I asked my VR counselor to support my study aboard at this school. He made a conditioned offer. If I take up a sign language class to learn to sign, he would support my study. I accepted his offer. He made arrangements for me to have a private deaf tutor to teach me ASL. Her name was Lorraine Sullivan, the wife of Frank Sullivan, Grand President of National Fraternal Society of the Deaf. She taught me not only ASL but also deaf culture. She introduced me to meet wonderful deaf leaders at her gatherings who happened to alumni of Gallaudet University. Hence, they were my role models. And, the beginning of my journey to find my identity as a deaf person.

Fast forward. The best time of my life as a young adult was at Gallaudet University as a senior even though it was for one semester only in the fall of 1969. I met many deaf students who welcomed me with much warmth. My only regret is that I did not have a chance to meet many seniors (i.e., Class of 1970) because I was spending too much time with a younger deaf girl I met at this school.

Further fast forward: Went to New York University for a Ph.D. clinical psychology program with financial assistance through Graduate Fellowship Funds (GFF) Program at Gallaudet University as well as academic assistance from the Deafness Rehabilitation Program under Dr, Jerome Schein. His co professors were Gallaudet Alumni, such as Dr. Allen Sussman, Dr. Larry Stewart, Dr. Doug Watson, and Dr. Glenn Anderson. All the wonderful people who provided me invaluable advice and guidance about working with deaf people in mental health.

Ten years later, a twist in my life where I was laid off as a psychologist due to the expiration of soft money grants. I ended up setting up Harris Communications. I thanked Gallaudet University for providing me the opportunity during my study aboard to develop and eventually maintain networking contacts which, in ten years later, significantly contributed to my success in business through deaf trade shows, deaf newspapers and magazines, and the like.

Other thanks to Gallaudet University is as follows: The Publication Office at Gallaudet University asked my company to outsource its distribution center of publications across the nation for two years while they went through reorganization reforms.

In close, as a result of the aforementioned episodes of my gratitude to Gallaudet University, I wanted to give back something to this beloved university. Consequently, I made an annual donation to the university for many years. Last year, it was with much pleasure and Bison pride that I designated Class of 1970 as the recipient of my donation.



With our deepest condolences, **Joanne Stump-Nelson** passed away on March 16th of this year in Quebec, Canada. She was married to Norman Nelson, Gallaudet U class of 1964. They were at Gallaudet University last fall 2019 for Norman's 55th class reunion. Joanne's obituary is posted in the Class of 70 Memorials.



My freshman year was a growing experience in so many ways! I lived in Peet Hall, facing Ely Hall. These were the days where we had to sign in and sign out when leaving campus. We weren't to leave campus alone. There were dress rules. We had to be in the dorm early every night because of curfew. There were no TTY's back then. No cell phones or video phones. If I wanted to call my mother, I had to either have the Housemother call for me or find someone who could hear well enough on the phone to do it. And all calls were reverse charges. Or the US mail did our communicating for us. There always seemed to be rules to follow, a dependency on others, and at times it was frustrating.

But we had other means of communication. Sometimes I could look out the window and talk to a friend if it wasn't dark out. If it was dark, we could go to the bottom of the stairwell and chat there if it was after curfew. But I especially liked one system I had for a while and remember fondly. I was dating someone who lived in Ely Hall. He was a real good guy. We talked and laughed a lot. He kissed me good night when I had to go to the dorm because of curfew. We had a lights out policy – I think it was 11 or so. So, every night around that time I would look out my window. He would blink his room light 3 times to let me know he was thinking of me and to say good night, and I would blink 3 times back. I always looked forward to those 3 blinks and went to sleep with a smile on my face.


Hi fellow 70ers,
