May you stay healthy, keep safe and be happy.



My "68C" Story Submitted by Karl Kovach

Since I was 6 years old, I've made a hobby of all-around handyman work like plumbing, automotive mechanical and body repair, carpentry and woodwork, electrical, TV repair, etc. but my work with a 1931 Model 'A' Ford Cabriolet 68C stands out as special. This is the story of how it changed my life and inspired me to become an Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA), judge.

I first met Donna Callaway in late 1970, after graduating from Gallaudet. We both loved camping and often went with friends until, eventually, we started dating and I met her parents. Her father, Donald was so proud to show me the unrestored 1931 Model 'A' Ford Cabriolet 68C that he had bought for \$250 when Donna was 10 years old. "This car has a rare body style," he told me, as he pointed out parts where the design had changed in 1930 after the start of the Great Depression. He told me of his post-retirement plans to paint the body, install a new seat and top, and fix the engine so they could use it as a pleasure vehicle and ride around in it for fun. Donna loved the car and remembered fondly going for rides in it around town with her father.

In June of 1987, years after Donna and I had married, her father suffered an aortic aneurysm and died suddenly. Because Donna loved it so much, his will stipulated that the 68C was to be given to her and I felt that I needed to take up the work he had planned to do on the car and learn why Donald was so proud of its rarity. Luckily, he had saved all the original records and documentation for the car as well as several of Model 'A' Ford magazines from the '60s and '70s. After some of years of research, I came across a helpful contact from the Cabriolet Club of Texas and, after exchanging many emails, he requested some information about the car (engine and frame Vehicle Identification Numbers, body code, and pictures) to conduct his own research into its provenance. The results were unbelievable to me! Of the approximately five million Model 'A' cars that Ford produced in 1931, 6,842 were Cabriolet 68Cs with only 250 remaining intact. Donna's was one of only five cars in existence to match VINs on the engine and frame, signifying the originality of the parts.

My contact at the Cabriolet Club of Texas told me that the slant-windshield 68C body style was introduced on March 31, 1931, and is, as my father-in-law had told me, considered a rare body style. Manufactured by the Briggs Body Company for Ford, the Cabriolet is a convertible with glass side windows, unlike the canvas side curtains found on many other roadster models, with a shipping weight of 2273 lbs. and a 1931 price of \$595. The 68C had two different manufacturing periods during 1931: early '31 and late '31 with notable differences in the carburetor, firewall, and rearview mirror assembly at the top of the windshield (early had three screws and late had two screws). Donna's 68C is the late model, beginning July 1931 and lasting until the end of that model year.

Continuing my research, I ran across a section of the "How to Restore Your Model A" manual dedicated to the 1931 Cabriolet 68C and was surprised to find that the Editor, Laurence Plate Jr., was a Gallaudet graduate ('57 Chem and '60 Math) as well! I reached out and we spent the next two years conversing via VP. Laurence, who has owned two 68Cs, had learned a great deal about them from his father who was employed with Ford during that era and was able to give me a great deal of information about the car and its proper restoration. For example, I recall asking him why the engine and frame VIN were dated to March 1931, but the body code was dated somewhere between July and the end of 1931. He explained that in those days Ford didn't assemble the whole car at one time. The engine and frame would be manufactured and then shipped off to one of 6 different plants around the country. Some months later, for the 68C, the Briggs Body Company would take the frame and engine and attach the body to them. I was fortunate enough to meet up with Laurence in Prescott, AZ during the second week of March 2015 on my way to the National and Grand National AACA meet in Tucson and asked him to sign my copy of the "How to Restore Your Model A" manual.

In early 1994, I began disassembling the 68C and learning more interesting things about the car through the process. I discovered that the fuel system is gravity fed, unlike modern pump-based fuel systems, and the braking system is completely mechanical! No hydraulic lines or fluid at all, just a series of metal rods connecting the front and rear brakes with the pedal. I managed to disassemble the chassis parts, sandblast, and paint them with a primer coat before needing to put the 68C restoration project on hold. It would be nearly 7 years before I could return to it. In 2004, I decided to turn the remainder of the restoration over to a professional restoration shop to ensure it was done as correctly as possible (to factory specifications) so that we could compete with it in car shows. The restoration was completed in August of 2006 and when we surprised Donna's mother, Loretta, with the fully restored car she exclaimed tearfully, "Oh! Donald must be so proud and happy up in heaven!"

Donna and I began traveling to various car show around the country, eventually becoming members of the Model A Ford Club of Cape Cod, Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA), Model A Restorers Club (MARC), and Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA). The AACA, founded in 1935 and headquartered in Hersey, PA, is the largest with over 50,000 members in the United States, Puerto Rico, Canada, and the UK and we would average about 7 trips per year just to AACA shows. In October of 2007, Donna and I won our first National AACA award during their annual Eastern Division National Fall Meet in Hershey, PA. They have meets in various states, with an average of 200-500 cars each meet, but the Eastern Division National Fall Meet is AACA's largest show, with over 1000 cars on the show field, 10,000 vendors, 200-300 cars for sale or auction. And about 150,000 attendees each day of the four-day event. You can learn more about the AACA on their website at www.aaca.org. Since that first win, our 68C has gone on to win many of other awards:

- AACA National First Place 2008
- AACA National Senior 2009
- First place Concours D'elegance in Holmdel, NJ 2010
- AACA Grand National First Place 2011
- AACA Grand National Senior 2013
- First place in Henry Ford's 150th anniversary at Greenfield Village in Dearborn, MI 2013
- First place Choice by Committee in Father's Day in Hyannis (Cape Cod) 2013
- AACA National Award Winner Ford Award (first deaf winners since the trophy was introduced in 1976) 2014
- Best Restoration in Blast From The Past Car Show South Dennis, MA (Cape Cod) 2016
- First place in Annual Heritage & Garden Museum in Sandwich, MA (Cape Cod) 2017

We've been fortunate to have met a great many interesting and friendly people in the antique car community, and among them, Former U.S. Attorney Guy A. Lewis stood out. He was appointed Director of the Executive Office for the U.S. Attorney by Attorney General John Ashcroft in 2002, serving until 2004 under George W. Bush and Bill Clinton and has been a great friend to the antique car community. I met him at a National AACA Meet in Homestead, FL in 2010 where he had 8 antique cars registered for the show with all 8 receiving awards. Another good friend I've made through the community is Dave Zimmerman, an AACA VP Judge, who wanted me to become a judge and told me, "Being deaf doesn't matter, you can judge the cars by visual

inspection and attend AACA Judge and Continuing Judge Education courses annually." So, with that endorsement, I applied to become a judge in 2011 and am now the second deaf judge in AACA history, the first deaf judge having been active in the '90s and subsequently stopping due to health reasons. I'm currently a Senior Master Judge based on credits earned, and one of about 300 judges total in the AACA.

As with many people in the antique car community, restoring and showing that the first car sparked a passion for the hobby and my collection has grown to six antique cars:

- 1928 Ford Model A Phaeton
- 1929 Ford Model A Phaeton
- 1931 Ford Model A Cabriolet 68C "Donna"
- 1931 Ford Model A Tudor
- 1968 Firebird convertible
- 1982 Corvette

Since Donna's death in 2016, I have been working to restore the 1968 Firebird she bought when she was 18 years old with a rare L6 cylinder Overhead Cam engine. My goal is to complete the restoration before our 50th anniversary in September 2022 and drive the car to Florida as we did on our honeymoon in September 1972 to relive the memories. I've also named the Cabriolet 68C "Donna" in her memory, to keep it alive as part of our family heritage.






Kickoff Night Report Nikki Ekle and Cliff Boland, Co-coordinators
