



Interview with **Angela Stratiy (Petrone)** By Charmaine Letourneau



Angela Stratiy went on from Gallaudet to get her Masters at Western Maryland College. With that degree to her credits, she taught at the


North Dakota School for the Deaf for a couple of years. She later headed for her home city, Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. She taught at the school for the Deaf there for 14 years. During that time, she married a hearing man with whom she had 3 sons. Eventually she moved to Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, where she continues to reside for half the year, while snowbirding in Arizona for other half.

Angela is well known for her one-woman comedy show. Much of her materials is based on a deep understanding of the funny differences between the deaf and hearing people. She affectionately pokes fun at the hearing world. She's creative and hilarious. She often gets invited to perform in major cities across Canada and the USA. Angela says she gets her jokes from life experience and studying people. Her most memorable performance was at Syracuse, New York in 2005. Her name appeared in huge letters across the sign above the theatre. See a photo below. ("I would be very proud too," says Charmaine)



Angela says her parents, Forrest Nickerson (see my note at the end) and Gallaudet all had a huge impact on her life. They all gave her the confidence to be who she is today...a comedian, actress, workshop presenter, and teacher.

Angela is retired now, but this has not stopped her from writing a few books (see photos below) and she is still an active member in the Deaf community. She sometimes subs at the Alberta School for the Deaf, and she sometimes teams up with hearing interpreters to interpret for Deaf people. She enjoys doing some crafts and is very good at it. Charmaine's personal note:

Forrest Nickerson (now deceased) knew way back in the late 1960's before anybody, including William Stokoe, that our sign language was the true



language of the Deaf and that we do have a vibrant Deaf Culture. With that thought he along with Angela Stratiy, established a national organization in 1971 known as the Canadian Cultural Society of the Deaf. The purpose of this organization is to promote and preserve sign language and Deaf culture, and also to encourage Deaf people to take pride in their language and heritage. American Sign Language had not entered the English language until about 1980.
